OzAsia Festival

A spectacular lineup of works by Asian Australian performance artists take centre stage in this year's 'OzAsia Festival'. The program of free and ticketed events includes 11 world, and two Australian premiere performance works amid an eclectic mix of theatre, music, dance, comedy, film and visual art, at various venues around Adelaide from 21 October to 7 November.

Indonesian-Australian artist Jumaadi revitalises the ancient art of shadow play puppetry in Perahu-Perahu, while Justin Talplacido Shoulder enchants audiences with AEON†: TITAN ARUM, a dance performance bringing his other-worldly hybrid creatures to life with costume, music and

brilliant light. Japanese Australian artist Mayu Kanamori attempts the mammoth task of reuniting 300 family photographs with their owners in 'Untitled.Showa', and the 40-metrelong Hong Kong dragon parades the Moon Lantern Trail.
